FOR OUTDOOR ENTHUSIASTS

The Labrador West Chamber of Commerce is pleased to announce that it has partnered with community groups to enter local adventure destinations into TrailForks, a trail management system for outdoor enthusiasts.



he work done by the LWCC will allow residents and visitors to locate trails in Labrador West, plan outings, report on conditions, upload photos, track adventures and safely navigate trails. The app supports mountain biking, hiking, trail running, downhill skiing, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, snowmobiling and several other outdoor activities.

Get started by going to https://www.trailforks.com/signup/ and creating your own Trailforks account. The second step is to download the Trailforks app to your Apple or Android smartphone. Once the app is on your phone, choose your activity from the dropdown menu. The app will help you find trails, trailheads and parking. If you hit the record button in the app, Trailforks will track your activity. If you come to a fork in the trail and you're not sure which way to turn or how to get back to the parking lot, just look at the map on your phone, and Trailforks will show you exactly where you are. This feature works even when outside cellular service.

LWCC is looking forward to increasing exposure to trails in our region and providing this opportunity to expand outdoor living and its many benefits to our residents and visitors!

Help Promote Local Trails

Help promote healthy living and tourism by downloading the Trailforks app! The Labrador West Chamber of Commerce and local groups have partnered to enter Lab West's extensive trail network into the electronic mapping app called Trailforks. Trailforks is a crowd-sourced database, which means that the app depends on users to help grow and maintain the database by submitting new trails and updating existing ones, recording activities, and uploading reports. Trailforks is simple to use and makes increasing accessibility to trails easy for everyone. Simply download the app onto your phone, select the activity you are doing that day and hit "record." At the end of your ski, run, snowmobile ride, or whatever the outdoors is calling you to do, hit "save and submit." It's that easy. You can also upload photos of your activity and write reports, and for those who are trail and mapping enthusiasts, Trailforks provides lots of options for entering more in-depth data.

This is a great way to let friends and family know what outdoor activities you are participating in. At the same time, you will be letting the public know what trails are available in Lab West, which ones are popular, and what the trail conditions are. Trailforks is used by more than 6 million people around the world! The more that local people use the app and post their activities to Trailforks, the more Lab West and its network of trails gets promoted to residents, tourists and the world.

WE ARE TACORA

n celebration of Tacora Resources' 4th anniversary in operation, we are proud to present this publication on Tacora's history located in the community of Wabush, NL. Guided by our core values of Safety, Sustainability, Teamwork, Determination, and Winning, together as a team, we will win!

In July 2017, Tacora purchased the Scully Mine, with a 6 million tonne per year iron ore concentrate capacity. During the 2019 fiscal year, we restarted mining operations and commercial production at the Scully Mine. On May 25th, 2019, ore was delivered to the crusher and the first mill was successfully started up on May 28th, 2019. During June 2019, Tacora successfully commissioned its concentrator and produced its first batch of wet concentrate, undertook its first mine blast, and celebrated its first loaded train. On August 30th, 2019, we announced that our first seaborne vessel shipment of iron ore concentrate produced at the Scully Mine departed the Port of Sept-Iles, Quebec, with a payload of 69,770 wmt of premium concentrate bound for a customer in Europe. Throughout the remainder of the 2019 fiscal year, Tacora continued the process of ramping up commercial production (including bringing all six mills into operation).

Tacora worked with the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador as well as the United Steelworkers (USW) to bring mining jobs back to Labrador West and restart the Scully Mine in Wabush, NL. Today, over 400 Tacora Team members join in creating our workforce, 97% of which are local, and 25% being woman in the workforce. We believe our workforce is the most determined out there. In 2022, Tacora received the "Miner of the Year" award from the Canadian Institute of Mining, NL Branch, for the province of Newfoundland and Labrador. In year 2023, our team has already achieved multiple record production months since the beginning of operations. Our people make up our community, Tacora continues to work closely with our towns and local organizations in creating connectivity within our community. Since Tacora has been in operation, we have given back to our community and local organizations a total of \$707,345.00. Thank you to our team, our community, and our province for a strong 4 years of operation.

TAKING THE WHEEL

WITH MARTY BYRNE

'm not sure if you remember Ed Owen? He is now retired but he used to be an Art teacher at Menihek High School here ■ in Lab West. Well, Ed was also a member of the Visual Arts group that used to meet up here in Labrador City about 20 years ago and that's where I met him. He is a super talented painter, potter and all-around artist. I was speaking with him at our local grocery store about 6 or 7 years ago and he mentioned that he had retired and was leaving the area and I jokingly said to him, "What are you doing with your potter's wheel?" And he said, "Why, are you interested? Drop up to my garage tonight and we'll chat about it." I thought that perhaps he meant to sell it to me but when I got up there that evening, he said to me, "Marty, you have always been a really nice guy and I think you would get a lot of use out of this potter's wheel. I would like for you to have it." I thought he was joking. He continued "I would like for you to have the kiln too." He left town soon after and it wasn't long until Byrne'n Mud Pottery was born. It turned out that potter's wheel was one of the best gifts that I would ever receive in my life!

Since starting Byrne'n Mud Pottery I have had so many unique opportunities. I've hosted many ceramic crafting events with community groups and families here in Labrador West. I've traveled on Pottery tours to China. This past winter I traveled to Ottawa for the Northern Lights Arts and Cultural Pavilion. Most recently I got to spend a week in Troy Ontario at Donn Zver's School of Pottery job shadowing him, participating in the classes there and partaking in a once in a lifetime workshop with world renowned potter Cynthia Bringle from the U.S.

But no matter how far pottery takes me I will always be a community minded person, hosting fundraising events for local families, visiting our schools to make worry stones to help the kids with anxiety.

As much as I try to give back to Labrador West as an artist, it will never equal what they have given me through their support of me as an artist and of my little Byrne'n Mud Pottery business.

SUMMER AT CAMPS MOKEY

s a youth, I had the opportunity to attend a local camp for two weeks each summer. We participated in canoeing, sailing, hiking, swimming, games and opportunities for sportsmanship of all sorts. Each night ended with a gathering around the campfire. These adventures left a lasting impact on me and led me to friendships that have lasted a lifetime. As an adult living in a town with all the resources needed for a camp, and as the President of an organization whose facilities are adjacent to a pristine lake, it seemed fitting to support a similar camp. Whenever summer activity options were discussed, a summer camp was always on the table.

In 2020, Smokey Mountain Ski and Snowboard Club finally had the opportunity and the leadership to make it happen. Fast forward three years, and Camp Smokey is firmly established and thriving. This year we are holding eight weeks of day camps for kids

aged 6 to 14 years and a oneweek introduction camp for kids who will be old enough to attend next year.

We live in a wilderness paradise. Our kids need every opportunity to explore our wilderness safely. Nancy O'Brien, Sarah Pardy and their staff are doing a great job turning our dream for a summer camp into reality. While there is always room for development, we have happy kids and happy councillors almost every day, regardless of the weather.

An article in the New York Times summed up the post-COVID-19 return to camp this way:

"It's hard to imagine a more ideal escape for young people living through an extraordinary time of grief, loneliness, and upheaval. At its best, camp can offer children a chance to learn outside the classroom, drawing

them from their computer screens and helping them build stronger relationships with other children, themselves and nature".







Smokey takes the view that there is no reason why the youth of Labrador West shouldn't have the "Best Camp in Canada". It will take time to get there, but our staff strive every day to advance that goal. As our staff master the skills they have acquired over the past three years, we plan to add new elements to our camp experience. We have been extremely lucky to have Travis Maher and Katie Cromwell from St. Johns act as a resource from the beginning and we hope to keep them engaged as we develop our expanded Camp Smokey. Travis and Katie have been involved in the summer camp business for longer than they will admit and their understanding of staff and campers is paramount to developing our vision.

Camp Smokey currently operates as a day camp. Firstly, it is a fun place for youth to go to make friends and leave concerns behind. Camp is about the campers. The next most important elementis learning about the area

we live in. Thirdly, we focus on skills acquisition. We currently offer caanoeing, kayaking, standup paddle boarding, archery, map, compass and GPS skills, hiking, firebuilding, outdoor cooking, shelter building and many other activities. Over the next number of years, we hope to add elements which will be of interest to those outside the camp. I dream of seeing our staff progress to the point of holding overnight camps and longer expeditions. I would love to see a campfire evening as well, but all in good time.

The Menihek Nordic Ski Club (MNSC) invites the public to venture onto its trails that are now overflowing with life. Wild flowers are in full bloom and berries will soon ripen. Enjoy the shade from old forest trees as you pass the cool mountain streams flowing from the waterfall down to the lake. Nestled in the birch and spruce forest of the scenic Wapusakatto Mountains, MNSC offers 32 km of allseason trail systems. These trails are located 3 km from Labrador City and 27 km from the Quebec border. At the close of the winter season, the trails can be accessed for hiking, Nordic walking, running and mountain biking from June to mid-October.

In 2002, MNSC along with the Menihek Trails Group created the Menihek Twenty-four Interpretive Trails. information boards were installed to offer an additional educational experience. The boards provide descriptions on local plants and wildlife. Trail users can learn about the diverse vegetation and animal species as they move along the Koch Trail on the Waterfall Hike. This hike offers a choice of 2.9 km and 5 km distances. Observe the deciduous and old growth trees found at the 1.5 km mark. The waterfall can be accessed by climbing the stairs along its sides. This spot is the perfect place to take a rest or have a snack. A picnic table and barbeque are available for the public to use (charcoal barbeque supplies not included). The Dumbell Lake Hike, which involves taking the Dumbell Tour Trail and returning via Rideout's Run, showcases nature around the lake. MNSC has a new seating area at the bottom of Smokey Mountain on the way up to the waterfall. Ducks Unlimited Canada donated signage offering information on birds that are native to the area. Two benches provide a place to rest and take in the stunning lake view.

Users are advised to familiarize themselves with the trail system map before venturing

out. Two large scale maps are located behind the gazebo and at the start of the Dumbell Tour Trail. Take a photo of the map for quick reference or pick up a paper copy at Gateway Labrador. Let someone know where you are going and what time you expect to return. To prevent fires, MNSC does not allow smoking or lit fires on any of its trails. The waterfall barbeque should only be used when a fire ban is not in effect.

The scenery changes from season to season so come out and discover every facet of the MNSC trail system.

President Kelly O'Brien commented "It was another great season, about 25 new rowers which was awesome to see. Even our first juvenile team in over 5 years! Hoping this is a start of getting the sport back from the Covid backfall. And thank you to all the sponsors, the Town of Wabush and all the volunteers for making this event happen once again."

Brittany Young added "It was nice to see so many spectators come out to cheer on the races." 
