Plus it gave them time to get groceries without me "helping" them. After a few years of being in the Jackrabbits ski program, it was put on hold due to the 2020 pandemic. However, this turned out for the best with regards to skiing. With not many other options for things to do, my parents got their own skis and we skied all the time as a family. Pretty soon we were regulars at the ski lodge, my parents now help with the program every week.

Once the pandemic was over, the provincial ski team returned to holding their Lab Camp training at our ski club. I got to meet other skiers from around the province and to talk to coaches. Seeing how fast the team was on the snow was amazing. I knew I wanted to be that fast too. My parents decided to send me out to as many ski races as they could, sometimes I even got to fly on my own!

The next year I was invited to join the training camp and participate with the team. We spent lots of time training and learning how to be better skiers. We also spent a lot of time playing social games and building friendships. Some of these friends come from families who have skied their whole lives, and others are newer to skiing, like my family. We learn a lot from each other and have the most fun.

I had an awesome opportunity in January of last year where I raced in the trials for the Canada Winter Games. The top six racers would qualify for the games, and I came seventh. The coaches reminded me seventh was nothing to be disappointed over and to keep working hard. I have been training hard since then and have a goal to participate in the 2027 Canada Winter Games.

This past year I was invited to join the provincial ski team and I attended a dryland training camp in PEI where I trained with Paralympian 8-time medalist, Mark Arendz. He is a truly inspiring individual with a great sense of humour. Most people view cross country skiing as a winter sport but it is important to note that it is all year long. Training starts in May and we train hard all summer. I also got to compete at the Eastern Canadian Ski Championships in Sherbrooke, QC and with Team Labrador at the NL Games in Gander, NL. The provincial team coaches always make sure to include some non-skiing fun whenever we travel, they are the best!

Skiing has made me very strong and fit, but also, it has taught me how to work hard and stay focused. I often have to train by myself and find the motivation to push my body when there is no one else to race against. My parents tell me this will help me in other things in life, and I think they're right, but it is still really hard sometimes.

Without some very important people none of this would ever be possible. My Mom and Dad are the very best and are always there



to help and push me if I need it. Dad skis with me sometimes and has helped me get up when I have fallen, but now he's the one who usually needs help getting up from a fall, always laughing. Everyone from Menihek Nordic Ski Lodge have given me support since the first time I put on a pair of skis. They are like family to me now. My teammates' families have taken me in as their own on weekends away from home. My provincial ski coaches have encouraged and pushed me to do my very best. olin started to Cross Country Ski at the tender age of 4, and has been skiing ever since.



# REACHING NEW HEIGHTS: LAB WEST SUMMIT CHARTS THE FUTURE

n February 26, 2024, Mayor Belinda Adams kicked off the 'Future of Lab West Summit' with a stirring address, declaring, "We need to be a town with a mine, not a mine with a town."

This three-day event, hosted at the Wabush Hotel, was a rich conversation in economic development and what our future could look like if we act now.

While Labrador City and Wabush are indeed mining towns, they're much more than just that. As Mayor Adams pointed out, these are vibrant communities filled with heart and soul. Though the mines are at the centre of these towns, they rely on the dedication and hard work of countless men and women. Men, women (and families) who also need access to housing, healthcare, childcare, and travel options—and these must be both accessible and affordable for the community to thrive.

The Summit was a call to government, industry, and community to amplify the urgent issues shaping our community's future. Not just discuss them but find creative solutions. The event centered around tackling six critical pillars: Healthcare, Housing, Labour, Travel, Energy, and Mining. These pillars represent not just isolated issues but interconnected facets of a complex problem. By bringing these key players under one roof and into one conversation, the Summit aimed to present irrefutable facts that demand attention and action. The agenda was packed with leading experts, presentations, and panel discussions, including a presentation on the economic outlook of the region by economist Gregor Macaskill of Gardner Pinfold Consultants.

In Labrador West if you ask any resident, they will likely recount a tale echoing a sentiment of being overlooked by both federal and provincial governments. This was our experience as we compiled concerns from the public before the Summit, with both a public consultation and a physical comment board (pictured). Amongst the hundreds of concerns, the common themes: housing (particularly senior housing) and healthcare. Many people are disillusioned with the government and any new initiatives to bolster the economic development of the region. Premier Dr. Andrew Furey joined on day one to deliver the keynote speech, praising the region as an "incredible economic engine for the province", but despite this recognition essential services and infrastructure remain deficient.





### A LESSON IN ADVOCACY

The Summit marked a historic moment, bringing together a diverse group of changemakers who had never come together in a forum of this nature. It was a testament to the power of collaboration and collective action in addressing complex challenges.

In the wake of the event, the real work begins - holding stakeholders accountable for their commitments and maintaining momentum on crucial action points. LWCC spearheaded this effort, signaling a shift towards self-advocacy and empowerment within the community. The main takeaway from the event? It is only through collaboration that progress will be made. The journey ahead may be challenging, but with unity and purpose, Labrador West is ready to shape its destiny.

### SHARING WITH THE COMMUNITY

The three-day event was filmed, and key segments will be shared in the coming weeks on CRRStv. Follow the 'Labrador West Chamber of Commerce' on Facebook for schedule updates.

LWCC will be making a presentation to the community: "Summit: What We Learned" will be a free event open to the public on June 18th at the Arts & Culture Centre. Here a final report will be presented summarizing our key takeaways, and how we plan to find solutions to these challenges.

# Local Bands Do Big Work in Lab Wes



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# HARVESTING COMMUNITY SPIRIT:

### EXPLORING LABRADOR WEST COMMUNITY GARDENS

he Labrador West Community Gardens (LWCG) is an area off Route 500 where community members can rent a section of land (i.e. a plot) and start growing! In 2023, the local community gardens had over 150 members with 176 plots. The LWCG dates back to the 1970's.

Vegetables grown are as unique as the individuals growing them. Of course, root vegetables, like potatoes, are a staple here in Labrador West, and gardeners have success growing many varieties of spuds, turnip, cabbage, and carrot. In 2021, the largest cabbage recorded was 11 lbs, grown by Wesley Moores. In 2023, the largest turnip recorded was 21lbs, grown by Maresa Brazil. Many members are known around the gardens for being skilled growers of certain veggies...Colbourne's corn, Coish's carrots, Moyles' beets, Laing's garlic, and Wentzell's zucchini, are just a few. Other successful produce grown at the gardens include broccoli, cauliflower, lettuce, onions, rhubarb, radish, daikon radish, peas, Swiss chard, bok choi, and the list goes on. There are also many gardens with beautiful designs, decorations, and landscaping, such as those of the Edwards, Alexander, Hunt, Mercer, Dawe, Wheaton, Morris, and Power families.

The community gardens have always been a family affair, with many members, such as the Whiffens, Morrisseys, and Skinners who have plots passed down from their fathers, and other members currently sharing plots with parents, children, and close



friends. Some members have been neighbours for years. Gardeners can find a sense of community, and the comfort of familiar faces with many members stopping to chat or offer seasoned advice to newbies.

Traditional garden plots are not all that can be found there. The LWCG has vegetable boxes constructed for the sole purpose of selling vegetables at the annual Farmers Market held each fall. These boxes are weeded and harvested by community garden members and their families. Three vegetable boxes were donated to the residents at Long Term Care at the Labrador West Hospital in 2023 and this year 12 boxes will be used by gardeners experiencing illness, injury, or mobility concerns, which can make traditional gardening difficult. None



of this would be possible without the generous support of CRRStv, Northern Industrial, IOCC, The Town of Labrador City, Rona, the White Wolf Snowmobile Club, and many other community supporters.

Whether you are new to gardening, an experienced grower, or just want to experience the peace and tranquility of the property, take a little walk around the LWCG this season. You will be sure to find someone that will show you around, and maybe even put you to work hauling a few weeds! 

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
